"Fatigue had come slowly over Siddhartha like a veil or a fine mist; it became a bit denser every day, a bit murkier every month, a bit heavier each year. As a new dress in time becomes old, loses its beautiful color, gets stains and wrinkles, becomes worn at the seams, and becomes threadbare in spots here or there, Siddhartha's new life after he separated from Govinda had become old, losing color and splendor as the years went by, or gathering wrinkles and stains, and showing ugliness here or there. Hidden at the bottom, disappointment and disgust were waiting; Siddhartha did not notice it. He noticed only that the bright and reliable voice inside of him that had woken him up in that time and had always guides him in his best times had become silent."

Hesse reinforces the mystical nature of Siddhartha's quest using extended metaphors and similes, a combination of short and long sentences, the repetition of phrases and clauses, and relatively simple vocabulary.
