Objective: Comprehending dialogue

### **Chapter XII**

### **Communicating and Speech Writing**

Objective: Debating President Carter's pardon to draft evaders

Activity

Brunner and Monaco discuss draft dodgers who burn their draft cards and flee the country to avoid going to war. Brunner believes that these people are cowards and that they are contributing to more American deaths in Vietnam because the squads are undermanned. Monaco, however, feels that people must do what they feel is right, even if it is illegal.

In 1976, President Jimmy Carter extended a full pardon to nearly 10,000 men who had evaded the Vietnam War draft. His action was intended to create calm and unity among Americans, but it managed to produce unrest because of its controversial nature.

Consider both sides of the debate and decide whether you support or oppose President Carter's decision to pardon draft dodgers. Write a persuasive speech, no longer than two pages long, in which you try to convince the audience of your viewpoint.

Begin your speech by describing the problem and presenting a solution. Clearly state the reasons why you feel that your perspective is correct. Demonstrate sound reasoning by supporting your argument with facts. Also, argue any popular opposing viewpoints. A well-written, persuasive speech not only supports the speaker's view, but also appeals to the interests and desires of the audience.
