




"Words can be like X-rays if you use them properly—they'll go through anything. You read and you're pierced."



Aldous Leonard Huxley was an English writer, novelist, and philosopher. He wrote nearly fifty books and was nominated for the Nobel Prize for Literature seven times. During his productive career, he wrote novels and novellas, short stories, poetry, nonfiction essays, and screenplays. His most famous works are the dystopian novel **Brave New World** (1932) and the nonfiction **Doors of Perception** (1954). Known primarily as a social satirist, Huxley was also fascinated by subjects like ESP and reincarnation. He died of cancer at the age of 69 on November 22, 1963—the same day as another British author, C.S. Lewis, and United States President John F. Kennedy.
