Pre-Reading

Research

Objective: Placing a literary work within its historical context

Refining research skills by consulting a variety of sources

Activity 1

Before reading any work of literature, it is useful to know information regarding the novel's background. *Things Fall Apart*, written by Chinua Achebe and published in 1959, is set in Africa during the 1890s. Achebe based his story on the Ibo (Igbo) tribe of Nigeria.

In groups, research the following topics using all the different sources available:

- the treatment of woman and children among the Ibo tribe
- the use of music among the Ibo
- the use of parables and proverbs among the Ibo
- various tribal customs and beliefs of the Ibo
- the ethnic, religious, and linguistic diversity of present day Nigeria
- the effects of colonialism of Africa in the late 1800s
- a geographical study and representation of Africa and Nigeria both in the late 1800s and today (maps, topography, crops, water, etc.)

After researching the Ibo tribe, present your findings to the class. Presentations can be in the form of oral reports, power point slide programs, or creative videos, and can include but are not limited to handouts, posters, overheads, charts, and maps.

Activity 2

Things Fall Apart is set in 1890s Nigeria. Use all available resources to research Nigeria as it was in the 1890s and as it is today. Based on your research, write a descriptive essay comparing the two cultures and indicating the cause and result of such changes.

5.	Be prepared to deliver your monologue to the class. Use appropriate oral presentation techniques, such as speaking in a clear and audible tone, making eye contact, and using effective gestures.

Okonkwo's second wife Ekwefi "had suffered a good deal in her life. She had borne ten children and nine of them had died in infancy, usually before the age of three." (Pg. 77) This misfortune is attributed to *ogbanjie*, wicked children who are repeatedly reincarnated. Because of the deaths, Ekwefi gives her children names that reflect her belief in the reincarnation process. In addition, names are so important to the members of the Ibo tribe that they hold naming ceremonies seven weeks after the birth of a child.
