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

My Ántonia TEACHING UNIT

Objectives

By the end of this Unit, the student will be able to

- 1. infer the thoughts, ideas, and actions of the characters when they are not expressly stated.
- 2. define the term "legend" and discuss how the legend of the sunflowers illustrates the idea that the West provides people with the freedom to begin a new life.
- 3. discuss the following metaphors in the story and point out how they contribute to the reader's understanding of the characters:
 - the prairie dog community as a metaphor for the Shimerda family.
 - the Indian circle as a metaphor for the cycle of life.
- 4. cite incidents from the novel to support or refute the presence of the following themes and concepts in this novel:
 - the role of pioneer women in helping settle the West has been understated
 - the influence of childhood experiences cannot be appreciated until adulthood
 - the power of nature to shape lives and the natural cycle of life
 - the importance of the immigrants in settling the West
 - preoccupation with the acquisition of material possessions frequently has negative effects
 - there is an uneasy relationship between artists and society, in which artists are often misunderstood and unappreciated
- 5. comment on the following symbols in the story:
 - the land as a symbol for freedom
 - Ántonia as the epitome of the hardworking female pioneer
 - the plow as a symbol of arduous work and the pioneers' struggle to tame nature
 - the fruit cave standing for the pioneers' success
- 6. point out how the author's love of the land is shown in her imagery and is a motif that runs through this work.

Questions for Essay and Discussion

- 1. How does Willa Cather's love for the land come through in this novel?
- 2. Describe how the Shimerda family is different from the Burden family in the following areas: food, language, religion, values, wealth, common sense.
- 3. In what ways are the Burdens good guardians for young Jim? How are they a problem for him?
- 4. Why do you think Jim and Ántonia are never romantically involved?
- 5. What reasons does Lena give for not wanting to get married? How is her life in Lincoln and San Francisco similar to Frances Harling's life in Black Hawk?
- 6. What qualities does Ántonia possess that make her a good mother? Support or argue against the following statement: Ántonia's strength and endurance are symbols for the strength and endurance of the pioneers who settled the West.
- 7. Support the following statement with evidence from the text: Jim's feelings are often reflected in Cather's descriptions of nature.
- 8. Discuss the significance of the word "My" before Ántonia in the title of this book.
- 9. Find examples of personification and simile in Cather's descriptions of nature.
- 10. Discuss how the land is considered a symbol of freedom for Jim, Peter, Pavel, and the other immigrants.
- 11. Read the description of the plow at the end of Chapter 14, Book II. What does the image of the plow silhouetted against the setting sun symbolize?
- 12. Many critics believe Chapter 14, Book II is a turning point in the story and in Jim's life. What happens in this chapter to make it significant?
- 13. Support the following statement: Ántonia's children, who emerge from the fruit cave, are proof that she has lived a successful life.
- 14. Support or refute the following statement by referring to the novel: Willa Cather believes that marriage is not always good or necessary for women.
- 15. One of Cather's favorite themes is the relationship between artists and society. Which characters in the story are artists? How does being an artist affect the chances of a happy life?
