Activity

Haiku is a traditional Japanese form of poetry based on the number of syllables in the poem, not the number of words. Haiku poetry is most often written about elements of nature, such as weather, trees, plants, or animals. The most common form of haiku consists of three lines with five syllables in the first line, seven syllables in the second line, and five syllables in the third. One other unique feature of haiku is that the author usually avoids using metaphors or similes.

An example of a haiku poem:

Winter snow slides from The eaves. Drops—plop—on my head. As I walk under.
