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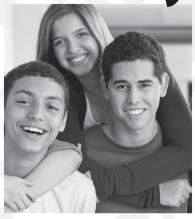

Objective: Identifying elements of figurative and literal language

Activity

A literal sentence is one in which its meaning is limited to the meaning of each word in it. A figurative sentence is one in which the meaning is symbolic, often using such literary devices as personification, hyperbole, similes, metaphors, and idioms. Usually you can identify figurative language by its use in a sentence. For example, Frederick says, "The apple was reason." (Pg. 171) An apple cannot be reasonable because reason requires the ability to feel and think; instead this is an example of figurative language.

In your group, review this chapter, and identify phrases that use figurative language to convey a thought. Then write the literal meaning of the phrase and its intended figurative meaning. The first one is done for you.

Activity

One of the main themes in *A Farewell to Arms* concerns the inevitability of death. Sooner or later, all persons give themselves up to death; but until that time, they must continue to move on through life regardless of what happens around them. The following passage summarizes Frederick's attitude toward life and death:

If people bring so much courage to this world the world has to kill them to break them, so of course it kills them. The world breaks every one and afterward many are strong at the broken places. But those that will not break it kills. It kills the very good and the very gentle and the very brave impartially. If you are none of these you can be sure it will kill you too but there will be no special hurry. (Pg. 249)

Assume the role of Frederick, and use his attitude toward life as a basis for a speech that you must deliver at the National Federation of Veterans. Be sure to evaluate the interests and beliefs of your audience before preparing your speech.
