Latin FACERE, FACTUM, "to make; to do"

FACSIMILE

That edition of the US Constitution was a poor *facsimile* that looked like it was made on a cheap copier.

n. a copy; an imitationL. facere + similis, "like" = made likesyn: duplicate





FAC, FIC, FECT

Latin FACERE, FACTUM, "to make; to do"

DEFICIENT

Mom wouldn't let us buy the cereal because she said it was *deficient* in vitamins.

adj. not having enough; lackingL. de, "down" + facere = made down, made less

syn: incomplete

ant: sufficient





Unit Two

POS, PON

Latin PONERE, POSITUM "to put; to place"

DEPOSIT

The cab driver did not wish to *deposit* his passengers in the middle of the dangerous street, so he drove to the side of the road.

v. to put down; to drop
L. de, "down" + positum = to put down
syn: deliver

POS, PON

Latin PONERE, POSITUM "to put; to place"

COMPOSITION

Bronze is a *composition* of copper, tin, and other materials, like aluminium.

n. the makeup of somethingL. com, "together" + positum = to put togethersyn: content

STAT, STAN

Latin STARE, STATUM, "to stand; to stay"

STATIONARY

Mark preferred the thrill of the open road to his *stationary* bicycle.

adj. standing still; not moving syn: stable

ant: traveling; moveable
