## ALLITERATION

The repetition of beginning letter sounds within two or more words of a phrase, sentence, or longer passage.



Alliteration (a lit ə rā' shun)

### **EPISTROPHE**

#### The repetition of words or phrases at the end of successive sentences.



Epistrophe (ə pis´ trə fē)
